The pupils of the 2019 Year 11 cohort have achieved another set of impressive exam results. 47% of pupils have passed the new more challenging grade 5 in both English and maths (against a national average of 43% and up from 45% in 2018).

There were also some excellent results in other subjects with an overall figure of 73% at grade 4 (C) or better – against a national average of 70%.

We are proud of all our students and the hard work, perseverance and teamwork that they demonstrated not just in Year 11 but during their whole five years at Yardleys. We wish them every success in the next stage of their education and in their lives generally.

teaching & learning...

guided reading

Every morning at Yardleys begins with a 25 minute class reading session led by a form tutor. All pupils and staff read the same book in each year group focussing on vocabulary, the plot or narrative and of course developing a love of reading. In the new academic year we are also looking to improve pupils' oracy skills by ensuring they read clearly and loudly so that everyone in the room can hear every word.



assessment week June 2019

All pupils in years 7-10 sat practice exams in all their subjects during our second assessment week of the year. During the week normal lessons are cancelled and pupils sit exams or focus on their revision using study skills and techniques they have learnt all year.

curriculum development in subjects

During the summer term, once Year 11 have finished their exams, Heads of Subjects and their teams focussed on planning their curricula for the new academic year. The school supported this with extra CPD days and other time for subject teams to really consider and plan out a coherent five year programme for all pupils.

CPD and new lead practitioner

Training for all teachers and staff is a key priority for the school. To this end we have appointed Ms Deakin as a second lead practitioner to help develop our training and support programme. We will continue to provide as much time as possible for subject based training on Thursday afternoon as well as many staff working as GCSE examiners, collaborating or sharing ideas with other schools both locally and nationally.

year II revision and GCSE pod

One of the ways we endeavour to help pupils in their revision and preparation for their GCSE exams is through the online programme GCSE pod which is freely available to all pupils via the school VLE & website. This programme has hundreds of mini lessons of 3-5 minutes duration on nearly every subject and topic studied by pupils. This helps to provide alternative explanations where pupils have struggled to understand something in the lesson or to refresh or consolidate their learning.





The school has made several changes to the building and internal organisation of the school over the last year. The new extension has provided extra classrooms for the English team, thereby allowing all teachers have their own to room. homework system

The school homework system continues to focus on pupils revising and learning the knowledge essential in each subject in the booklets summary (Knowledge Organisers) that they are given. They are then tested on their learning via the school's online quiz system – Frog Play.

For example we invited local police officers to talk to pupils about the dangers of knife crime. We continue to welcome our longstanding friends from Loudmouth Theatre into school to perform various thought provoking plays on a variety of personal safety and wellbeing issues.

In July we issued the first personal development reports to pupils and their parents & carers. These were summaries of individual pupils' achievements, activities and skills that had taken place outside of lessons. Features of the reports included attendance & punctuality, books read, enrichment activities attended, homework, school values demonstrated, prizes attained, participation in charity, sports or extracurricular activities as well as careers & employment guidance and any personal achievements.


media studies

science trip to GCSE live!

The UK's largest STEM fair was attended by our Year 9 cohort, all of whom are now studying triple science. Pupils interacted with scientists and professionals from a wide range of STEM careers. There were practical workshops using medical equipment such as an ultrasound machine and an ECG. They also participated in dance workshops, slime making, Lego robot construction and drone flying as well as watching the live stage shows with many LOUD explosions and stunning science on display.

healthcare aspiration
