I am delighted to be able to bring you another edition of the Yardleian, the school newsletter published for over 100 years. This academic year of 2022/23 has already been a season of reflection of yesteryears, notably the national mourning of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and, more locally, our former Headteacher, Mrs Jones. For many, this has triggered feelings of grief, but also celebrations of lives given to so much loyal service. This newsletter gives just a small flavour of the many wonderful activities and opportunities our students and staff are involved in. As I often say, learning in the classroom is only a small part of a child's school experience. What is also important is the learning that takes place beyond the classroom and the wider opportunities that help to shape our students' thinking.

Reflecting on some key events within school this term, in September we held a highly successful open week with much interest from prospective parents, despite the school continually being oversubscribed. In October, we had an encouraging visit from the Minister for School Standards and we held our annual 'Attitude to Learning Day' almost 90% of parents/carers who signed up for appointments.

We have welcomed eight new members of staff to our school ranging from Attendance & Welfare, Computing, Languages, English, Music as well as an additional Assistant Headteacher, Ms Robbins. We have also provided a number of teaching placements and academic mentors within a range of subjects.

We also hosted a number of themed events, such as European Week and have facilitated many field trips, sports events, tournaments, extra-curricular clubs and enrichment opportunities. We also continue to welcome a number of parents into our school for workshops, such as ADHD, Dyslexia, Y11 revision.

I am pleased to announce that the school will be bringing in new caterers in the new term and is currently working on introducing a new praise and reward system. More details will follow in due course.

From all the staff and trustees at Yardleys School, we hope that you have a peaceful break and all our best wishes for the New Year. We look forward to seeing students back in school on **Wednesday 4th January 2023.**

Overall, it was an excellent day, with many students clearly excited about their results and looking forward to their future destinations.










Attitude to Learning Day

Music Maestro!

Music and Performing Arts remain an important aspect of the school's curriculum and 'whole child' aim. Since the relaxation of the challenges faced by Covid, we were able to appoint Mr Dodds, Head of Music in September and will continue to offer GCSE music to all students.

Mr Dodds comes with 8 years' experience as a music teacher and is very much a 'one man band' when it comes to playing instruments, including guitar, drums, bass, keyboard and is heavily into music production and technology, having recorded all of the instrumental parts for the backing track for the new staff tradition of performing the '12 Days of Christmas'.

One of our aims at Yardleys is for students to take up the opportunity to complete GCSE music. To help with this, we are investing heavily in musical instruments and making greater use of the sound room and IT equipment for students to write, record and sample their own music.

Yardleys has a rich history of music and we would like to expand its offer to include new and exciting experiences outside of the curriculum. This will include instrumental lessons, extracurricular clubs and trips to experience the local music scene, historic venues and recording studios in order to give a broad view of what music has to offer for recreational purposes, career opportunities and benefits to life and

mental health generally. Initially, the instruments offered for additional lessons will include: drums, guitar, bass guitar, singing and piano, with plans to expand into brass, strings and world instruments from a variety of cultures. We plan to showcase this for parents, trustees, friends and staff members in concerts and other events, celebrating students' progress each term and we very much look forward to seeing you then.

The Music Department historically had a strong ensemble ethos. All musicians work together as part of a band, choir, duet, quartet or as a whole-class, uniting musicians and equipping students with the skills of teamwork, the discipline of learning and practice and the lifelong benefits of resilience and creativity that are needed both in music and in all other aspects of life. Expanding the experience of music at Yardleys now will give students a passion to continue their development as performers and appreciative cultured musicians beyond Yardleys. The experience offered is designed to give students responsibility for their musical progress, towards being lifelong musical enthusiasts enriched with the skills and knowledge to continue making progress beyond the classroom.

School Choir

Yardleys is founded on British values and tradition, one of which has been that of the Yardleys School Choir, often winning awards for performances across the county. We would like to resurrect the school choir and currently have a unique opportunity of working with a third generation Choir Director, Ms Wilson. She has been involved with many projects, including working with schools across the West Midlands and with well-known names, such as the Ministry of Defence. We see this as a great opportunity, especially as she lives right on our doorstep in Yardley, Birmingham and is passionate about helping us get together and sing!

The 'Station Clock' - Our students make history!

Miss Ling & Miss Price took eight students to Birmingham Conservatoire on 10th November 2022, to take part in the recordings for a new Station Clock, being permanently installed at HS2 Curzon Station public plaza, Station Square.

The clock is a new large-scale public artwork created by Turner Prize winning artist Susan Philipsz. It is a sonic clock that will sound on the hour, every hour over a 7-day cycle with a changing composition of the voices of 1,092 Birmingham and Solihull residents; our students will be the tones of 3pm and 4pm.

The students were really excited and, in the words of **Eimaan Saghir**, it was a *"big slay"*. The clock will be completed in 2028/2030, so we will just have to wait a little while longer to hear their enthusiastic vocals.

How Parents Can Help

- Establish a good routine in the mornings and evenings so your child is prepared for the school day ahead.
- Make sure your child goes to school every day.
- Take family holidays outside term time
- Ensure your child arrives at school on time
- Arrange dental and medical appointments outside school hours when possible.
- Always inform the school if your child is absent due to illness.
- Take truancy seriously if your child is not attending school as you expect they may be putting themselves at risk Who are they with? What are they doing?
- Talk to your child about school and take an interest in their school work (including homework).
- Praise and reward your child's effort and achievements at school.

School attendance and the law

Section 444(1) Education Act 1996:
"If you are the parent of a child of compulsory school age who fails to attend school regularly,
you are guilty of an offence."
" The court can fine each parent up to £1,000 per child, order payment of the prosecution
costs, impose a victim surcharge, and/or make a Parenting Order.

Section 444(1A) Education Act 1996:

rection 444(1A) Education Act 1996:
"If in the above circumstances you, the parent, know that your child is failing to attend regularly at the school and fail without reasonable justification to cause him/her to attend, you are guilty of an offence."

The court can fine you up to £2,500 per child and/or sentence you to a period of imprisonment of up to 3 months, impose a victim surcharge and order payment of the prosecution costs.

Travelling abroad during term time

The main reasons recorded for student absence at Yardleys, include illness, late arrival at school/lessons, no reason provided (unable to make contact with parents/carers) and unauthorised family holiday/absence. The school receives a number of requests for holidays to be taken during school term time, the huge majority are not authorised. The school has always been clear that leave cannot be taken during term time, except in exceptional circumstances. Absence not only disrupts a student's learning, but can adversely affect the learning and behaviour of other students in their class. Please be aware that where any child is absent for a prolonged period without authorisation, this can result in legal action which may then lead to court action, a fine, a criminal record and put the child's school place at risk.

Careers

Year 11 Leavers' Destinations

The 2021/22 Year 11 leavers' destinations resulted in 99% of the year group having a positive destination, continuing their education and training at a college or apprenticeship training provider. Leavers went into a wider range of post-16 options including apprenticeships and T-Levels, with 63% of the leavers continuing their studies on a L3 qualification (choosing either A' levels, a BTEC Extended Diploma or a T-Level). There was also a strong focus on Science Technology Engineering & Maths ("STEM") subjects with 61.5% of students choosing a STEM-related course.

Careers Programme

Some examples of the range of opportunities:

- Amazon Web Services Ten Year 8 girls are currently taking part in this programme which aims to inspire more girls to think about going into careers in technology. It provides an opportunity for students to find out more about the technology sector and take part in a competition to design an app, with the best designs being entered into a national competition.
- Taster Day at the Hall Green Campus, South & City College A group of Year 10 and Year 11 SEND students attended the taster day, which provided an opportunity for them to experience what it is like in a college. The students got to try a range of tools (under supervision!) to make a door stop in the shape of a slice of cheese.
- Work Experience Programme (13-17 March 2023) Year 10 students have had a number of assemblies about the programme and been tasked to find their own placements, having been given tips on how best to approach employers. Part of this programme will also involve students taking part in mock interviews in January, to be carried out with representatives from a range of external employers. We encourage all students to complete work experience as this gives an opportunity to gain a better insight into certain occupations, develop people skills and maybe even do something good for their community. It also helps with having a broader aspect on personal statements for UCAS applications!
- Assemblies Several post-16 providers have delivered assemblies to the Year 11 students, helping to make students aware of the different post-16 routes that are available and to gain a better understanding of entry requirements.
- University Experience Taster Day A group of high achieving Year 7 and Year 8 students attended University of Birmingham to learn more about what universities have to offer, the range of courses that are available and the opportunity for the students to ask some very inspiring questions about Higher Education. Students were inspired by a number of Student Ambassadors from the university who talked about their university experience.
- Birmingham Conservatoire 'Station Clock' As mentioned on page 5, a group of students from Years 7-9 had

their voices recorded in actual recording studios and were given an opportunity to find out more about some of the different job roles within the

creative sector.

■ Future Makers Show - Six Year 11 students got to go to the show at Millennium Point, designed to inspire the next generation of engineers and makers. The show was supported by some large engineering employers, many of whom sent their own apprentices along to inspire the students.

Wide range of activities



Prize draw


Each half-term enrichment block, staff nominate two students from each activity to enter into an end-of-year prize draw. We will bring more details about this as the academic year unfolds.

The Library

Yardleys School is very privileged to have been given the opportunity by the Federation of Children's Book Groups to participate in choosing the books for the national Children's Book Award 2023. Our students are currently reading and voting on the long list of books for this prestigious event next year.

Book club - What are you reading?

During enrichment, we have been running the 'Reading for Pleasure' activity where students are encouraged to read books of their choice, write reviews or give verbal recommendations to others, whilst some students help with displays of books and make bookmarks etc.

Separately, a group of other students have been visiting Al-Furqan School to run a reading group. Ms Deakin also started a Professional Reading Group for teaching staff this term. We therefore wanted to expand the offer to our students here. If any students are interested in leading or joining a book club as part of extra-curricular or enrichment activities, please speak to Mrs Keskinkilinc in the Library or Ms Patrick.

Pastoral

At Yardleys, our pastoral team, led by our senior leaders, Ms Basra and Ms Yates, oversee and provide a range of pastoral provision. Within school, this currently includes mentoring, a school counsellor who visits twice weekly and Heads of Year support and family liaison. We retain two counselling sessions each week to accommodate urgent referrals. For example, in the case of unexpected traumatic events, such as a close family bereavement. Our extensive range of extra-curricular clubs and enrichment activities also provide a huge opportunity to develop the 'whole child', aiming to help students better manage their emotions, physical and mental health. A triage of senior staff meet half-termly to review both safeguarding and mental health referrals.

We continue to develop all of our school programmes, including pastoral, and are considering further preventative measures and early intervention support, which may extend to include more specialist support, whether via sign-posting or bringing in external charities and other such organisations into school.

The Bereavement Journey

Cruse Bereavement Support

We recognise that there may be specific traumatic or life events, such as family bereavement, job loss, serious accident, illness or separation, all of which can impact on students' behaviour and the

ability to focus on tasks. As mentioned on the front page, this past year has seen a number of bereavements, including for some of our students. Bereavement is often described as a 'journey' and needs the love and support of a community of people. More specialised information and external support is available, such as via the charity website, Cruse Bereavement Support who provide some really helpful and practical material, including specifically for children and those who support others going through the grieving process, all helping us to better understand and support our friends, family and colleagues.

Special Educational Needs & Disability ("SEND") - Parent Workshops

To further support the parents/carers of our SEND students and to promote the fantastic community inclusivity that we have here in Yardleys and are so proud of, we have run several parental workshops this term. The workshops have focused on autism, Attention Deficit/Hyperactive Disorder ("ADHD") and moderate learning difficulties, with the latter being divided into two sessions for Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4, as this need is by far the most common in schools. Each workshop was designed to inform and inspire a greater understanding of the child's need, including reference to definitions, characteristics and strategies of support. This was followed by an open forum, including Questions & Answers where parents/carers were able to share ideas, their experiences and good practice. The sessions have been well attended, with some parents/carers commenting that it was 'helpful', 'very informative', and that they 'learnt things they did not know or understand'. Some especially found the open forum really useful, particularly as they could share their own experiences with those of others, pick up new strategies or adjust slightly the ones they were already using.

From my own perspective, I found the sessions to be extremely useful, especially listening to the experiences and strategies used by the parents/carers of our SEND students and am really pleased with the feedback and requests for more sessions. A huge thank you to everyone involved, especially our parents/ carers, who by taking part made the sessions a success. I am also grateful to our SEND students, who teach me something new every day.

Geography

It has been great to get the students back out and about, experiencing beyond the classroom what they learn within the classroom. Since the restrictions of Covid 19 have been lifted, all year groups ay Yardleys School now experience practical fieldwork. We tried virtual fieldwork during lockdown times, but you simply cannot beat getting out into the world and testing in reality the models and theories learnt in the classroom.



Year 7 will be studying the microclimates around the school site in the summer term and starting to build their geographical enquiry skills. How exactly is geography fieldwork different from a science experiment and what skills can you take from one area and use to help you in another are some key questions that we ask. Students will learn how to ask sensible and realistic enquiry questions and then carry them out.

Year 8 students travelled to the Lickey Hills Country Park to investigate the local deciduous woodland ecosystem. Students had to navigate around the site using their map skills to investigate the local flora and fauna, aided by the Ranger Team. They also spent time working together to build waterproof shelters from forest materials.

Year 9 students looked back at the industrial history of Birmingham, how the factories of the city became unprofitable and closed down and then what happened to the sites. The fieldtrip to study urban regeneration at Brindley Place and to ask if the money spent was worth it, a complete success, and if so, how. One student even found time to find out how uncomfortable a policeman's hat was!





At Key Stage 4, students take these same skills and build on them, investigating upland environments at Carding Mill Valley in Shropshire and evaluating the impact of the coming HS2 line to inner city Birmingham.

It has been a pleasure to get all students back out into the world and I am proud of the effort and enthusiasm both students and the members of staff put into the fieldwork provision here at Yardleys School.
