INTENT: To develop creative learners and thinkers that demonstrate resilience, progression and creative expression through the medium of art. Through the exploration of drawing, painting, printing and 3D work students are encouraged to self-reflect and experience a sense of accomplishment and pride in the work they produce. All of this is underpinned by the formal elements of art and design and typically in response to a historical or contemporary artistic influence or concept.

Year 9 teaches students about a variety of artists throughout the 20th century; what their work is, why it's created and how we can respond to it using techniques and materials from the classroom. This project was created for 2021-2022 to address gaps in student's contextual understanding of art practitioners and spans 2 – 2.5 terms. Although a lengthy project, students study many new artists and we explore new disciplines so that each artist becomes a 'mini project' within the scheme of work. This also maintains student's interests whilst learning about professionals within Art and Design. An underpinning of portraiture is taught in the summer term to equip students with more robust skills for drawing faces; this recaps previous knowledge from year 8 regarding placement of features and basic drawing skills which can enable more complicated and realistic drawing skills.
